## Hassell Franklin supports Mississippi State University furniture research facility with generous gift

A recent \$1 million gift from a state furniture executive will help Mississippi State build a new center for furniture manufacturing and management.

The gift from Hassell H. Franklin, founder and president of Franklin Corp. in Houston, will supplement the \$3 million in state funding appropriated last year for the building.

Franklin Corp. is a national leader in producing reclining chairs and motion furniture. It

is one of the nation's largest independently owned furniture manufacturing companies.

An MSU alumnus, Franklin serves on the Furniture Research **Unit Advisory** Board.

Skip McCollough is a 1979 forestry graduate. The McColloughs own and operate South Mississippi Forest Products in Hattiesburg, which they founded in 1990. He also is president of Southern Timber Resources of Louisiana Inc. The company buys timber and provides timber management assistance to private landowners throughout South Mississippi.

## Franklin gift, continued from cover

Products Laboratory was established in 1987 by the Mississippi Legislature and is currently the largest furniture research program in North America. Research conducted by the unit is estimated to save the state's manufacturers more than \$3 million annually.

The university will propose to the state Board of Trustees, Institutions of Higher Learning, that the building be named the Franklin Center for Furniture Manufacturing and Management. The center will house an interdisciplinary program to draw on the strengths of the colleges of forest resources,

business and industry, and engineering.

The planned 30,000 squarefoot facility will contain research laboratories, classrooms, an auditorium, and office space. Architects are currently designing the building with construction scheduled to begin in spring 2001.

## New series planned in continuing education

Wildlife biologists, habitat managers, catfish farmers, commercial herbicide applicators, and interested landowners in the South have a new partner in their pursuit of lifelong learning. The Office of Continuing Education is teaming up with CFR faculty members to develop a new series of courses designed to meet their unique learning

In the first course, Drs. Dale Arner and Marty Brunson will deliver a twoday program entitled Identification and Management of Inland Aquatic Plants. The course includes: an overview of modern philosophy and practice, a primer on plant characteristics, a slide presentation that details aquatic plants and their distinguishing features, a session on methods and approaches to aquatic plant control, an overview of collection and identification techniques, and a field trip where participants collect and identify aquatic plants and then discuss appropriate management responses. Each participant receives a reference notebook, a set of durable field identification cards, and a valuable textbook, Florida Wetland Plants, an Identification Manual.

Arner and Brunson's outline wetlands (green-tree reservoir will be followed to develop a sequence of courses including *Identification and Management of:* Inland Aquatic Plants, Inland Wetland Plants, Coastal Wetland Plants and Upland Plants. The series will culminate with a certificate program on Wetland Delineation.

In late October, the CFR's Dr. Rick Kaminski and Bob Harris, habitat biologist with Ducks Unlimited Inc., will present a two-day short course designed for professional wildlife habitat managers and private landowners. Waterfowl Habitat Manage*ment* focuses on management strategies for croplands and natural wetlands that commonly the FWRC, visit the web site attract dabbling ducks and geese. Subsequent short courses will address coastal

wetland management for waterfowl if there is sufficient demand.

Participants will learn about life-cycle needs of waterfowl and how they can meet these needs through habitat management; the habitat management complex (flooded cropland, natural wetland, and refuge); waterfowl responses to managed habitats; values and management of flooded cropland, moistsoil habitat, forested

management), and beaver impounded wetlands; how to build waterfowl habitat impoundments; and how private landowners can find assistance from Ducks Unlimited, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and other organizations. There also will be a section on wood duck habitat management. Field trips to public and private managed waterfowl habitats will highlight the short course.


